
BIPOC MN OUTDOOR WILDERNESS EXCURSION

In September 2022, MPR did an In-Focus segment regarding, "<u>How to Overcome the So-called Nature Gap</u>." Historically, outdoor recreation has been a white, wealthy, able-bodied and male-dominated realm. Here in Minnesota, about 20 percent of Minnesotans identify as people of color. But according to a Department of Natural Resources study, people of color make up only five percent of state park visitors.

Research has shown the importance of both in classroom and outside of classroom learning experiences for student success and development.

Aligning with our mission to "advance gender equity for women and girls via "education," Branch President,



Mahogany Morrison recently shared a presentation with our Board regarding the challenges and disparities facing BIPOC communities who often lack both the resources and opportunity to engage in simple outdoor recreational activities such as swimming, camping, hiking, fishing, boating, and canoeing.

In response to this presentation, the Board approved a BIPOC MN Outdoor Wilderness Excursion for a group of 8 BIPOC AAUW University Student Affiliate women members, which will be led by Mahogany at the Golden Eagle Lodge in Grand Marais this Memorial Day weekend.

Art has been a way for me to find joy.



News from AAUW Book Club

The AAUW Thursday night book group read FOSTER by Claire Keegan for their March book. FOSTER is a novella that includes a heartbreaking story of childhood, loss, love, and compassion. It takes place in County Wexford, a rural county located in southeastern Ireland. The book is written from the perspective of a young girl who is taken by her father to live with relatives on a farm for perhaps the summer or longer since her mom is pregnant with her 4th child. The child's father is an alcoholic and has trouble holding down work and spends little time at home. It's a story about two families, one who has lost their only child and the other who seemingly have more children than they can adequately care for. The author has won numerous writing awards and was shortlisted for the Booker Prize in 2022. The book group recommends it!

- Linda: I liked the writing style easy to envision the characters and their living arrangements.
- Barb: The story involves underlying sadness but is a great read.
- Donna: The story involves the young girl finding love and kindness in her foster family (aunt and uncle); things she doesn't experience in her birth family home.
- Kathryn: My family is Irish and I was interested in this story of Irish families including the young girl that was the main character.
- Donna: One could identify with the young girl being fostered for the summer. The Kinsellas shared kindness with her, such that she had not really experienced at home.
- Mary: Even though it was heart wrenching at times, there was hope, and the young girl learned a lot about love and compassion, during the summer spent at the Kinsellas.



- Suzanne: I thought the story was one of hope...it stays with you. The ending is one that you need to define.
- Trish: Reading the book on my Kindle, it seemed like it ended too soon or perhaps too abruptly. Since it takes place in the early 80's, there are hints of "the Troubles" that were prevalent in Ireland and Northern Ireland during this time.
- Laura: Very poignant story about a young girl and her life at home (where she was quiet and invisible) and then her life for a summer with a family that cared.


