IMPORTANT: Some Memberships Expire on June 30th!

If that is you, be aware that National has started distributing email reminders about when and how to renew your AAUW membership (does not apply to Student Associates or Graduate Students). During a recent conference call, it was announced that National plans to send three email reminders to a member as they approach their expiration date. In our branch, 60% of our memberships expire on June 30th.

Your membership has been vital in making AAUW the only organization advancing gender equity for more than a century, and I hope you'll continue to build on this legacy by renewing soon!

Here's how:

To pay online: Visit <u>aauw.org</u> or click on this link: <u>AAUW Login page</u>.

- If you have visited the Community Hub before and have already established an account you can log into your Personal Snapshot.
- If you have not, click, Forgot Your Password located below the blue login button at the bottom of the page.
 - Enter your email address of record, then click Reset Your Password to receive a login email from <u>infosf@aauw.org</u>.
 - If you don't receive it in 5-10 minutes, email <u>connect@aauw.org</u>. PLEASE DO NOT CREATE A NEW ACCOUNT.
 - After you receive the login email, enter your email address and "Create and Confirm your Password" to access your Personal Snapshot.
- Once you are in your Personal Snapshot, click RENEW at the bottom of the screen to renew your national, branch and state memberships!
 - Dual members (member of more than one branch) should self-renew ALL memberships at once.
 - College/University representatives whose national membership is covered by the school should email <u>connect@aauw.org</u> to request a special code before renewing.

To pay by check: send your payment to our VP of Membership.

- Make the check payable to AAUW.
- Annual membership is \$108 (\$79 National, \$2 State and \$27 Branch).




NEWS FROM AAUW BOOK CLUB

Barb Wismer hosted Kathryn, Linda, Mary, Laura, and Suzanne on May 25th in her home filled with color and personal memorabilia. She graciously gave us a tour of her home designed with unique architectural touches.

"The Hero of This Book" by Elizabeth McCracken:

This book, "is a novel, but not quite." It is also a memoir about the author's mother, so, part memoir and part fiction because the author "wanted to make up some stuff." It is also about the art of writing a memoir. A novel as an eulogy.



The author, in mourning after her mother had died, revisits London to reminisce about a 2016 trip with her mother where they had an exceptionally good time. The descriptions of her mother's personality and determination to overcome her physical disabilities add humor and poignancy to this memoir. Her mother was not quite 5ft. tall, walked with a cane, Jewish, born in Iowa, had a PhD from the U of WI. and both she and her husband were on the staff of Boston, U... She was a feisty and independent woman despite her disability related to cerebral palsy. "She was a complex woman who didn't approve of Barbie dolls, bagels cut in half, tutus on small girls, or Young Adult fiction" She loved clothes and shoes, and would take a frozen chicken leg to work for lunch in her purse.
